Breed/genetic specifics








#### Note well:

## Holiday Amaryillis

- Amaryllis spp (Naked ladies –outside plants
- Hippeastrum genus (holiday blooming amaryllis)

In general GI irritation, vomiting, diarrhea







## Paper Whites

Narcissus, Jonquil
Bulbs are most toxic part

Most often limited to GI signs but can progress to death

Tulips - similar

# Lilium spp. and Hemerocallis spp.

- ALL PARTS INCLUDING VASE WATER AND POLLEN ARE CONSIDERED TOXIC!
- Acute renal failure develops quickly
- Early treatment is imperative



#### NO LILIES FOR KITTIES



#### Cats and lilies don't mix!

Lilium species ("true lilies") such as Easter, tiger, Asiatic, Oriental, etc., and daylilies (Hemerocallis) are highly toxic to cats (not dogs or people). Ingesting petals, leaves, pollen, or even water in the vase can result in kidney failure and death. If your cat eats any part of a lily, call Pet Poison Helpline, your local emergency clinic or your veterinarian immediately.

Early treatment is imperative!

#### SEE BELOW FOR SAFER FLOWER CHOICES FOR CATS

Other lily varieties shown here such as peace (Spathiphyllum), Peruvian (Alstroemeria) and calla (Zantedeschia) are much less dangerous and cause only minor symptoms when eaten.







SAFER\* cut flower choices include: Roses, sunflowers, tulips, irises, carnations, mums. baby's breath, hyacinth and daffodils.

\*These flowers may cause vomiting and diarrhea but are not considered life threatening.

#### Christmas Kalanchoe

- Devil's backbone, Christmas
   Kalanchoe, Flaming Katy
- Mother of Millions; Mother of Thousands
  - Evergreen succulent capable of vegetative propagation

Contains cardiac glycosides Tremors, vomiting/diarrhea, sudden cardiac death





## Cyclamen

Toxin mostly found in tubers

Most often
limited to GI
signs but can
progress to
death





#### American Mistletoe

- Phoradendron flavescens
- Vomiting, diarrhea, low blood pressure

(rare), difficulty breathing, low heart rate



### European Mistletoe

- Viscum album
- Vomiting,
   diarrhea, low
   blood pressure
   (rare), difficulty
   breathing, low
   heart rate





## American and English Holly

llex spp.

Leaves and berries are low toxicity

Vomiting, diarrhea and depression

- A single report way back then....the grim reaper!
- Vomiting and Diarrhea primary signs



#### Macadamia Nuts

Weakness, depression, vomiting, tremors and hyperthermia (increased body temperature) in dogs.



### Chocolate, Coffee and Caffeine

cause vomiting and diarrhea, panting, excessive thirst and urination, hyperactivity, abnormal heart rhythm, tremors, seizures and even death.




#### Guarana

contains two to four times the concentration of <u>caffeine</u> found in <u>coffee</u> <u>seeds</u> (about 2–4.5% caffeine in guarana seeds, compared to 1–2% for coffee seeds)
